

Intro to Office of Broadband Development

Office (OBD) was created in 2013 legislation

Charge:

 Encourage, foster, develop, and improve broadband within the state.

Purpose:

- To drive job creation, promote innovation, and expand markets for Minnesota businesses.
- To serve the ongoing needs of Minnesota's education systems, health care systems, public safety systems, industries and businesses, governmental operations, and citizens.

Office of Broadband Development Roles and Responsibilities - Highlights

- Work with stakeholders to facilitate, promote, and improve broadband infrastructure development
- Measure and map broadband availability across the state
- Provide technical assistance to providers and communities
- Administer the Border-to-Border broadband grant program
- Inform and support state broadband policy discussions
- Clearinghouse for state and federal program resources
- Measure, analyze, and support community anchor institution needs
- Support digital inclusion (literacy and affordability)
- Support inclusion of broadband needs into local planning processes
- Dig Once/conduit/ROW management/permitting
- Provide support to the Broadband Task Force



Broadband Development Grant - Infrastructure Purpose

- Grant purpose: To provide financial assistance for the acquisition and installation of middle-mile and last-mile broadband infrastructure to areas of the state that do not have wireline access at federal and state minimum standard speeds.
- Allowable costs: Examples of allowable costs include: project planning; obtaining construction permits; purchase and/or construction of facilities, including construction of both "middle mile" and "last mile" infrastructure; and installation and testing of the equipment used to provide broadband service.



Broadband Infrastructure Development Grant Round 10 – Overview

- \$50 Million available
 - \$30M Border-to-Border: can fund 50% of eligible total project costs (More points awarded for higher match)
 - \$20M Low-Density: can fund 75% of eligible total project costs
- Cap of \$10 Million per grant award
- Distributed in single competitive grant round
- Technology must deliver at least 100/20 Mbps and be scalable to at least 100 Mbps symmetrical
- Grant awards will be geographically dispersed
- All invoiced work must be complete by December 31, 2026



Broadband Infrastructure Development Grant – Overview - Eligibility

- Who is eligible to apply?
 - An incorporated business or partnership
 - A political subdivision
 - An Indian tribe
 - A Minnesota nonprofit organized under 317A
 - A Minnesota cooperative organized under 308A or 308B
 - A Minnesota limited liability corporation organized under 322B for the purpose of expanding broadband access



Broadband Infrastructure Development Grant —Application Process and Timeline

- March 12, 2024 Grant Application Information Released and DEED's Grant Management System Registration Open
- March 21, 2024 Broadband Grant Round 10 Webinar
- March 29, 2024 last day to notify existing providers of applicant's intent to file an application [required by Minn. Stat. 116J.395, subd. 5(9)]
- April 23, 2024

 first day an applicant may submit a completed application in DEED's Grant Management System based on when they completed their pre-application notification
- May 10, 2024— window closes so completed applications must be submitted in DEED's Grant Management System by 1:30 pm Central Time
- May 15, 2024 challenge process begins
- June 14, 2024 challenge process ends at 4:00 pm Central Time
- Summer 2024 awards are anticipated to be announced
- December 31, 2026 projects need to be competed (contract end date)



Preliminary Criteria for Application Acceptance:

- ✓ Application demonstrates that required contact was made with all other wireline broadband providers in the proposed project area(s) to determine provider interest by the March 29, 2024, deadline.
- ✓ Application proposes to serve unserved and/or underserved specified locations. Unserved areas are delineated from underserved areas in any dual-coverage project.
- ✓ Application proposes to offer broadband services at or above state speed goals of 100/20 Mbps
- ✓ Application demonstrates project scalability to 100 Mbps symmetrical, certified by equipment manufacturer or registered professional engineer.
- ✓ Application proposes a minimum of a 50% funding match for B2B or 25% for Low-Density.
- ✓ Application must be submitted on time. Applications due prior to 1:30pm on Friday, May 10, 2024.

2024 Round 10 (FY25) Challenge Process

- 3 business days after close of application window (May 10, 2024), proposed projects and speed offerings posted on OBD website (May 15, 2024) for review
- Challenges due in 30 days by provider (June 14, 2024)
- Challenges must be filed using the <u>location data template</u>
- Provider must already provide wireline broadband or commit to completing construction at speeds equal to or greater than 100/20 Mbps within 18 months after grant awards made (February 2026).
- DEED is prohibited from awarding a grant to a project where a credible challenge has been received



Scoring Criteria—Points Awarded for the Following

Border-to-Border applications are eligible for a maximum 120 reviewer scoring points; Low-Density Program applications are eligible for a maximum 140 reviewer scoring points and will be ranked on the following categories:

- Anticipated broadband improvements up to 20 points
- Grant funding request amount up to 10 points*
- Critical need/Community participation up to 15 points
- Project readiness up to 25 points
- Project sustainability up to 25 points
- Economic development and community impact up to 15 points
- Broadband adoption assistance up to 10 points

*only applicable to traditional Border-to-Border grant applications



Scoring Criteria (continued)

Additional scoring for Low-Density Program:

- Passings per mile up to 10 points
- Explanation of need for higher funding up to 15 points
- New application area up to 5 points



What Stage Should Your Application Preparation be at Now?

- Finalize locations/areas to include in application
- Identify and email your communications to existing broadband providers.
- Confirm project partners (provider partner, community partner)
- Complete project design, timeline, budget
 - if applicable, include cost and time for environmental reviews, railroad crossings, and prevailing wage implications
- Obtain financial commitments and verifications for match
- Continue to gather and document community support





Map of Round 10 Border-to-Border/Low-Density Eligibility

State Statutory Broadband Goals:

All homes and businesses will have access to broadband service of at least:

- -25 Mbps download by 3 Mbps upload by 2022
- -100 Mbps download by 20 Mbps upload by 2026
- •162,000 households without access to 25/3 (2022 goal)
- •229,000 households without access to 100/20 (2026 goal)
